

Future time clauses, zero and first conditional clauses (with all present and future forms) – B2 – Test 1

1. If I /finish/ my exams by Friday, we /celebrate/all weekend. (more possible answers)
 - A. will have finished/are going to celebrate
 - B. finish/will celebrate
 - C. have finished/will be celebrating

2. If you /not do/ the shopping, I /not can finish/ dinner by the time our guests arrive.
 - A. haven't done/won't have been able to finish
 - B. don't do/can't finish
